This Fall will mark the 144th year of Catholic education in the Butte community. Over 17,000 young men and women have earned diplomas from Boys Central, Girls Central, and now Butte Central Catholic High School. When you look back at this proud history it is truly remarkable to reflect on the incredible impact BC graduates have had on our community and beyond. 

Roy Simperman A True Friend of Butte Central

The Butte Central Catholic School community was saddened by the passing of benefactor and great friend, Roy Simperman of the Class of 1958. Roy passed away in Mercer Island, Washington, on February 27, 2025. For many years, Roy's generosity and support has made an incredible impact on Catholic education in the Butte community.

"We are so grateful to Roy and his family for his loyalty and dedication to Butte Central Catholic Schools," said Butte Central Catholic Schools President Don Peoples Jr. "We cannot thank him enough for his many gifts to technology, scholarships, and to our Annual Fund over the years." In the late 1990's, Roy and his wife Diane Corette Simperman established the Corette- Simperman Family Memorial Scholarship Endowment. This outstanding fund was one of the first Memorial Endowments created by a family. Since that time, the program has grown to 186 endowed funds established by alumni, classes, families, and individuals. Diane passed away in 2000.

In 2017, Roy established the Simperman Scholars of Academic Excellence Scholarship Program in Butte Central Catholic Schools. The scholarship program was designed to strengthen academic excellence and to assist students and families in their pursuit of Catholic education. Scholarships from the program have made it possible for hundreds of students to attend Butte Central Schools.

In his generous giving to the scholarship program, Roy has provided Butte Central Schools with an incredible matching gift program. Over the last six years, Roy has matched over \$500,000 in contributions to the Butte Central Scholarship Program. "We've been blessed to have Roy's matching gift challenge over the last several years," commented Butte Central Admissions Director, Sue Burt. "He has inspired so many donors and helped so many students attend Butte Central."

Fortunately for Butte Central Catholic Schools, the Simperman Corette Foundation has generously pledged to continue

matching contributions to the Butte Central Scholarship Program. The foundation will match all new scholarship gifts up to \$100,000 through December 31, 2025.

In addition to scholarships at Butte Central, Roy established a phenomenal scholarship program to assist Butte Central students attending Carroll College. The Simperman Scholarship Program provides four-year scholarships for BC students to attend Carroll. "Roy's generosity has paved the way for many BC students to attend Carroll," said Peoples. "As a Carroll graduate, I've been so proud to see Maroons become Fighting Saints."

Roy's generosity has also greatly impacted technology in Butte Central Schools. He funded the modernization of classrooms at both Butte Central High School and Elementary School. He funded two computer labs, interactive smartboards for all teachers, and hundreds of Chromebooks, computers, and iPads for students. His generosity made it possible for Butte Central Catholic Schools to offer state-of-the-art technology resources to students.

In recent years, the Butte Central Catholic School System has held a November Roy Simperman Appreciation Day. Students wrote thank you's to Roy and his family, and signs celebrating Roy's support were posted throughout both school campuses. Butte Central officials have announced that the tradition will continue with the annual Roy Simperman Appreciation Day each November. Prominent plaques honoring Roy's contributions to Catholic education are planned for both the high school and elementary. "Roy's impact on our school system has made an incredible difference for so many families," said Burt.

Roy attended Sacred Heart Elementary School where he was a member of the 8th grade class of 1954. After graduating from Butte Central, he went on to Carroll College and graduated with a degree in mathematics. He later went on to earn a Master's in Physics from the University of Nebraska and an MBA in Economics and Finance from the University of Washington. In 1994, he founded the Semaphore Corporation, a network engineering company that

designs online networking for video, voice, and data.

Roy's father, Roy Simperman Sr., owned and operated a lumber yard in Butte's East Side. The lumber yard was remarkably located at the current site of the Maroon Activities Center. A memorial service was held on March 1, 2025, at Carroll College in the beautiful All Saints Chapel. A large contingency of Butte Central Administration and supporters were in attendance.

Butte Central's Innovative 4-Day School Week! A GREAT SUCCESS

Last fall, the Butte Central Catholic School System joined over 260 Montana schools by adopting an innovative 4-day school week. The goals for the change included continued academic excellence, strengthening the school's community of faith, providing opportunities for experiential learning, and creating more family time. Improved mental health, better attendance rates, fewer disciplinary referrals, less bullying, and reduced stress levels for teachers and students were also cited as potential benefits.

After a full year in the new schedule, the jury is in and the response of the Butte Central community is overwhelmingly positive. According to Butte Central Catholic School President and Superintendent Don Peoples Jr., the new four-day school week was a great success. "Our students are engaged, our teachers are rejuvenated, and our school family seemed to enjoy the new format," he said.



In its decision to go to the 4-day school week, the Butte Central Catholic School Board made it clear that continued academic excellence was the top priority. A review of test scores and other school-related data revealed continued student success and achievement in compliance with this important goal.

In the Butte Central Catholic School System, the NWEA Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) test is used as the primary school-wide academic assessment. The test measures academic achievement and growth in reading, math, science, and language arts in 2nd through 10th grade.

Scores from the recent school year indicated that BC is growing academically in all four testing areas. Many BC students scored in the high achievement category, which positively reflects the quality of the educational program. A report prepared by the BC faculty and administration confirmed the new schedule allowed for more time to practice both fundamentals and new concepts. The longer school day provided extended time for learning to focus on material. "I've witnessed more intellectual engagement with the learning process," commented Butte Central High School Principal Denise Chrest. "This exciting development has led to the growth of our students."

In addition to the academic benefits, attendance rates improved and discipline referrals declined compared to the previous school year. An in-depth study of both attendance and student behavior revealed positive numbers. At the high

school, students were often out of the classroom for athletics and other activities on Fridays. The new schedule with classes primarily on Monday through Thursday eliminated many of the absences that would have occurred in the 5-day schedule.

Initial feedback from Butte Central Catholic School System parents has been favorable. Parents cited increased family time, reduced stress, and flexibility of appointments and activities, as the primary benefits of the 4-day format. According to Cassandra Cassidy, the mother of Calvin, a 7th grader, and Collin, a 1st grader, the 4-day schedule has been great for her family. "We've been able to spend more time together and we've been able to focus on other activities," she added.

Fellow parent Mandy Tippett, the mother of three Butte Central girls, agreed with Cassidy's thoughts on the 4-day school week's impact on family life. "Having an extra day off has been wonderful for our family," she proclaimed.

Another of the main concerns of the new format was the challenge of day care for working parents. In July 2024, Butte Central Catholic Schools partnered with the Butte YMCA to provide day-care services to families. The partnership proved to be an excellent solution. "The YMCA was excellent to work with from the beginning, and it proved to be a great option for our families," reflected Butte Central Elementary Principal Dawn Ann Peterson. "We are excited to continue the program in the upcoming year."

One of the unique features of the Butte Central 4-day model was the implementation of Empower Fridays. This innovative program featured academic enrichment, community service activities, social events, and sports camp opportunities for students. The academic enrichment experiences included math, reading, science, and art camps. A school-wide swim day was held at the YMCA, and elementary students sang Christmas carols in area rest home in December. BC football and girls basketball coaches also conducted camps for elementary and junior high students.

At the high school level, the schedule provided an opportunity for students to work and participate in internships. Many BC students took full advantage and utilized Fridays for job opportunities.

The final group to "weigh in" on the new format was BC's dedicated teaching faculty. The 4-day week proved to be a popular change for teachers. The new weekly schedule provided additional planning time to prepare lessons, correct student's work, and strengthen the quality of instruction. "Having Friday to do a lot more planning and organizing has been great," said BC Kindergarten teacher Peggy Kambich. "So much of what you focus on as a teacher depends on planning, and I find having that day has been very beneficial."

The BC administration hopes the 4-day week will help retain teachers and attract teaching candidates when openings do occur. Schools in Montana and throughout the nation are struggling to find teachers amidst an unprecedented teacher's shortage. When classes began last fall it was estimated that over 1,000 teaching positions went unfilled in Montana alone.

Looking to the future, the Butte Central faculty, administration, and school board will continue to review and evaluate the 4-day school week. Test scores and other school-wide data will be closely monitored. "Our mindset has always been to strive for excellence in our schools," reflected Peoples. "Our school community has embraced the 4-day school week, and we will strive to provide students with exciting academic and extracurricular opportunities."

"CA Journey Well Traveled"

When BC graduate James Holmes makes the trip to Cambridge, Massachusetts, this August to begin classes at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT), it will be the easiest part of his journey to the prestigious university. His dream to study at the world renowned research academic institution goes back to his 7th grade year and a hiking trip with buddy Jim Bradshaw. The two were traversing the East Ridge near Butte through Maud S Canyon when Jim suggested to his friend that he should really go to MIT for college.

"I didn't really know anything about MIT when Jim told me about it," reflected James. "I went home and asked my Dad about it later that day and it became the start of a dream and a goal for me."

It turns out that the elder Holmes actually applied to MIT while in high school but was placed on an enrollment wait list. "I started exploring it, and my Dad told me to work hard to achieve it," said James. To say the younger Holmes took his father's advice is a major understatement. For the next six years, he embarked on a trek filled with challenging academic course work, intense ACT preparation, and focused resume building.

A goal to score 35 on the ACT became the focal point along with successful completion of high-level college coursework. His driving motivation centered on MIT's exclusive acceptance rate of less than 8% of applicants.

Upon enrolling at the high school in 2021, James immediately began taking upperlevel courses. His freshman classes at BC included Pre-calculus with Dr. Denise Elakovich and Astronomy with Patti Small. Between his freshman and sophomore years, he took Calculus I on campus at Montana Tech. His sophomore courses featured Chemistry at Butte Central with Lana Whelan and Calculus II and III at Montana Tech. During his junior year, his course work included Statistics and Methods of Proof in the math department at Tech, and college Chemistry and Physics I. In his senior year, James took college Intro to Differential Equations and Physics II. To top off his

college experience, he also worked in the Metallurgy Department Laboratory for two years gaining valuable scientific experience.

In the summer of 2023, James took his first attempt at the ACT test and scored an admirable 30. In the spring of his junior year in 2024, he moved the bar forward and earned an outstanding 34. After an intensive few months of practice tests and prep work, he earned a phenomenal score of 35 in the summer before his senior year.



Last fall, James completed his application and submitted the final details of his impressive high school resume. In addition to earning 38 college credits through Butte Central's partnership with the Montana Tech dual credit program, James' list of accomplishments included an outstanding athletic career and an impressive community service record.

According to Butte Central Principal Denise Chrest, James served as a great role model to the student body through his commitment to academic excellence. "He challenged himself with the most rigorous math and science coursework and went on to excel in advanced classes at Montana Tech," she added. He also earned an impressive 4.2 GPA.

As an athlete, he competed for the Maroons in cross-country and wrestling. His coach just happened to be his father, Andrew. James qualified for the state wrestling tournament and the state cross-country meet in all four years of high school. He was recognized as an MCA Academic All-State Athlete in each of his four years as a Maroon.

He received the exciting news of his MIT acceptance on his way to wrestling practice in December. When he arrived, the first person he told was his coach and his father. "My Dad was super excited and proud to hear the news," said James. "We had a home basketball game that night, so I was able to share the news with Mrs. Chrest, some teachers, and friends," he continued. "It was awesome, everyone was so excited."

When asked about his high school experience James identified BC's small community and close-knit relationships with classmates and teammates as real positives. He also praised the school's religious education program and emphasis on serving others. "Overall, it was great to have Theology courses and to work in community service programs at school," he added. In addition to working the Annual Laverne Combo Thanksgiving dinner, James volunteered to ring the bell for the Salvation Army and was an active member of BC's Key Club Program.

When James arrives in Cambridge this fall, it will be his first time living on his own. He reflected on that major life experience and how much he will miss younger brothers Jack, Conan, and Donovan along with his parents, Andrew and Michal. "I'm looking forward to living in a bigger city but will absolutely miss my family," he added.

At the Butte Central graduation on June 1, 2025, James had the distinction of delivering the valedictorian speech to represent his class. He presented an outstanding message thanking teachers, classmates, and his family.

When the fall semester begins, James initially plans to pursue a degree in nuclear engineering. Although he will be thousands of miles away from the Mining City, his friends and family will be anxious to hear about his future accomplishments. "We will have no doubt that he will continue to inspire, innovate, and make a meaningful impact on the world," said Chrest.

Social Emotional Learning Program

Strengthening Central Elementary's Christ-Centered Community

It's hard to believe that Butte Central Catholic Elementary School is already 39 years old. The school opened in 1986 following a 17-year hiatus for Catholic elementary programs in the Mining City. In 1969, all nine Catholic schools closed during a major restructuring of the parochial school system.



When community leaders began planning for the return of a Catholic elementary program in the 1980's, they set out to develop a faith-based community. The driving force was a priority to bring God and faith into the classrooms and learning process. In addition, personal attention and the development of each student was a vital goal.

After 39 years, Butte Central Catholic Elementary has grown into a school centered on prayer, family values, and Gospel messages. An amazing group of teachers has served the school over the years. These dedicated educators have helped build a school that focuses on the learning and growth needs of students.



Butte Central's prayer and faith life includes a strong religious education program with an emphasis on serving others. Prayer along with faith formation opportunities are integral to the school environment. "More and more families are searching for faith-based educational programs for their children," commented Butte Central Catholic School's President Don Peoples Jr. "We are truly proud of our school's family atmosphere."

In the last school year, Butte Central Catholic Elementary implemented an innovative social emotional learning curriculum. The program helps students develop essential life skills such as emotional regulation, empathy, communication, and problem-solving. The overall goal of Everyday Speech, the new curriculum, is to promote a healthier school climate and improve academic and social outcomes. It encourages students to build positive relationships, make responsible decisions, and to manage their emotions.


The program is taught to all kindergarten through eighth-grade students by school counselor Lia Francisco. The curriculum features age-appropriate lessons using videos, guided discussions, and other interactive activities. "I really like the interactive videos and role-playing exercises," commented Francisco. "It really helped our students learn coping skills and how to find support in our school."

Staff members are already noticing improvement in the school climate as a result of the program. "We are already seeing positive outcomes since the beginning of the school year," reflected Principal Dawn Ann Peterson. "Overall interactions amongst students and teacher to student relations are stronger."

In the upcoming year, the school hopes to build on the progress made in the first year. Students and teachers alike are looking forward to continuing positive progress. Treating others with respect in a positive Christ-centered community is the ultimate goal of the program. "I really see growth in the way our kids communicate and work together," added Francisco. "There's a lot more we can do in the upcoming year."



In a world where technology dominates every aspect of life, science education takes on a vital role for students. Critical thinking skills, problem-solving abilities, and scientific inquiry are at the center of a successful K-12 science program.

At Butte Central Catholic High School, the science department is guided by two outstanding educators. Tiffany Ostenberg and Lana Whelan are leading a program with expanded course offerings and high-test scores. In February, Butte Central's measures of Academic Progress (MAP) Test were highlighted by positive school-wide science scores. Sophomores and freshmen taking the General Science assessment received especially strong scores with 76% of students scoring above average and 55% of students scoring in the high average to high score range. "Our test scores are reflecting student science growth and high achievement, which is exciting," proclaimed BC Principal Denise Chrest

The high-test scores are a positive reflection of the quality of instruction in the program. BC students are gaining confidence in their skills and reaching higher levels of achievement in science courses. "I think students are gaining confidence in science and displaying more grit in their academic approach," explained Whelan.

Consistency in instruction has definitely impacted the trajectory of the science program. Ostenberg will enter her third year with BC this Fall and Whelan will be in her 5th year when classes begin. The two have worked together to build a solid framework of science fundamentals and learning "Our program is designed around spiraling curriculum where concepts are reinforced and each time you learn them it is at the deeper level," said Whelan.

Ostenberg echoed Whelan's assessment and touched on the consistency of the program. "We have consistency in our approach, and we are seeing more kids interested in science," she added.


Another positive element of the science department is an expanded list of courses offered to students. Honors courses, dual credit college courses, and a wide variety of basic level science classes are available to students. The program has taken on a goal of

providing opportunities for students of all abilities. Courses offered by Ostenberg include Biology I, Honors Biology, Environmental Science, Zoology, Astronomy, Anatomy, Earth Science, and Engineering 101. Several of the courses are offered in alternating years to allow for the expanded options. Whelan, on the other hand, teaches Pre-Chemistry and Physics, Chemistry, Honors Chemistry, and Physics.

Both teachers have master's degrees, which allows them to offer dual-credit college courses through Montana Tech's Jump Start Program. Ostenberg offers Engineering 101, a course designed to introduce fundamentals of engineering concepts. Whelan offers college Physics to BC's top-level seniors.

High expectations are certainly prevailing in the program and are at the heart of both teachers. "I'm not an easy teacher," commented Whelan. "I think high expectations are very important, and I also believe in encouraging students to believe they can get there."

Preparing students for college is a goal that both educators have identified as vital to the BC approach. Recent graduates continue to excel at the college level, which brings a sense of pride to both teachers. "It's one of my personal goals for my classes to make sure my students are college ready," said Whelan. A look at the opportunities BC graduates are experiencing indicates that the science program is doing its part.

Going forward, the program hopes to continue to improve and meet the needs of all BC students. Preparing students for higher education, the workforce, and trade programs will prevail as the primary goal of the Butte Central Science Department.

Thanks to the dedication and hard work of both teachers, growth in the science department appears to be inevitable. "We are proud of our science success, and we look forward to the upcoming school year," exclaimed Chrest.

111 Years of Maroon Pride

Legend has it that Butte Central became the Maroons sometime in the late 1910's when a local sportswriter described the BC football team as the boys from Butte Central High clad in Maroon. Apparently, the squad couldn't afford uniforms of their own, so they borrowed an old set of faded jerseys from the Centerville Reds Independent men's team. Whether the story is fact or fiction, the nickname Maroons has embodied a sense of pride for over 100 years.

The first recorded Butte Central team took the field in the fall of 1914. Since that time, thousands of young men and women have represented the Maroon and White in nine different sports. Thirty-eight state championship teams highlight this proud winning tradition. Hundreds of individual state titles, and even more divisional and conference championships have been earned by Maroon teams and competitors. For over 111 years, "Maroon Pride" has been used to describe the tradition, toughness, winning mentality, and never say die attitude of Butte Central Catholic High School.



For over a century, Butte Central Athletics and Activities have relied on the support of alumni, boosters, community members, and friends of the school. Tuition dollars have never been used to fund Maroon sports, music, drama, and speech and debate. The generosity of BC supporters has made it possible for Maroon teams to compete at the highest level of Montana interscholastic activities.

In the upcoming 2025-2026 school year, the budget for the Maroon Activities Department will be \$345,000. Included in the activities program are 9 boys and 9 girls sports, cheerleading, speech and debate, music, pep band, and drama at the high school. In addition, the activities budget will fund 7th – 8th grade activities at Butte Central Catholic Junior High. Projected student participation numbers will surpass over 200 students in 7th – 12th grades.

According to Butte Central Activities Director Chad Petersen, there is great optimism and excitement for the Maroon programs in the upcoming year. "We're looking forward to building on our traditions while creating new memories that reflect the spirit and pride of Butte Central," he said.

In Butte Central Catholic School's funding model, the operating costs of the Maroon Activities Center, which serves as the home facility for BC activities, are the responsibility of the Butte Central Education Foundation. The operational budget of the MAC in the upcoming year will be \$227,552. This amount must be raised by the Butte Central Foundation through its annual fundraising efforts.

Butte Central School and Foundation staff members will work together to raise the \$572,552 to fund athletics and to operate the Maroon Activities Center.

The gate receipts from Maroon home games is projected to be \$40,000, which means that an additional \$532,552 must be raised through fundraising projects and events. The annual Butte Central Auction scheduled for March 2026 and the Maroon Activities Association Drive will serve as the major fundraising projects for Butte Central Activities.

The Maroon Activities Association Drive provides former Maroon athletes, alumni, parents, past parents, and the business community with exciting opportunities to sponsor Maroon activities in the upcoming year. The Maroon Activities Association membership drive offers game passes, Butte Central auction tickets, and advertising opportunities to supporters. All members are recognized in the Butte Central Catholic Schools Annual Report publication, along with game-day programs at Maroon home games, our website, and our social media sites.



Catholic education in the Butte community can trace its roots to the early 1880's when the Sisters of Mercy and the Sisters of Charity of Leavenworth began teaching the children of the mining camp. For 144 years, Butte Central Schools have been blessed by an incredible group of educators. Throughout the decades, both religious and lay teachers have been remarkable in their dedication to over 17,000 students.



Today, Butte Central Catholic Schools are staffed by an incredible group of teachers. All are highly qualified educators who possess a minimum of a bachelor's degree. Many have earned advanced and specialized degrees in educational disciplines. Collectively, BC teachers are exceptionally dedicated and caring. According to Butte

we are deeply grateful to our teachers and staff whose tireless service and guidance help shape the minds and hearts of our students." said Peterson.

Personal attention and individualized instruction are the hallmark of BC's educational program. Butte Central teachers strive to provide each student with the tools to succeed academically and spiritually.

In recent years, Butte Central Catholic Schools have experienced exciting growth. Enrollment during the recent 2024-2025 school year exceeded 430 students in preschool through high school. That compares to 360 students in 2022 and 400 students in 2023. In the upcoming 2025-2026 school year, enrollment is projected to surpass 475 students.

"We are thrilled to see our schools grow," said Butte Central Catholic Schools President and Superintendent Don Peoples Jr. "We are very proud that more students and families are choosing Catholic education."

Looking to the future, enrollment and the subsequent need for teachers is expected to be higher for BC schools. To complicate matters, schools in Montana and throughout the country are facing an unprecedented teacher shortage. Last fall, over 1,000 teaching positions went unfilled in Montana.

To meet this challenge head on, Butte Central Catholic Schools have focused on strengthening its Faculty Fund. In 2021, a proud BC graduate, who requested to remain anonymous, stepped forward with a substantial gift to improve faculty salaries. Over the last four years, this contribution along with the gifts of many other benefactors has greatly impacted the faculty salaries in Butte Central Catholic Schools. The goal of this program is to close the gap between public and Catholic school compensation packages.

"We are so grateful and appreciative to the donors of our Faculty Fund since its establishment four years ago," commented high school Principal Denise Chrest. "Our teachers are the heart and soul of our programs, and the Faculty Fund is a critical component of our school's educational excellence," she added.



BC school officials have set a goal of raising \$600,000 over the next three years. "It's critical that we continue to improve our faculty and staff compensation packages," said Peoples. "Our dedicated teachers are amazing, and we want them to stay in our growing school system."

The fourth endowment dedicated was the **Michael** (Mick) Joseph Family Endowed Scholarship.


The scholarship was established by Mick Joseph in honor of his family to benefit student athletes in the Butte Central Catholic High School track and field program.




